A TRIP TO THE OKTOBERFEST, 1985

The Munich Oktoberfest is the World's greatest beer-drinking celebration, held annually to honour Queen Theresia, wife of the Bavarian King Ludwig, and 1985 was its 175th anniversary. It is basically a gigantic fun fair which fills every hotel room in the area with visitors from all over the world. We arrived at 5 O'clock one evening and I was immediately stunned by the immense throng of people. I would estimate 200,000 attend on any night alone! The gigantic Ferris Wheel vies with other fairground machinery for rides which did seem nauseating to me just looking at them! The main attraction of course is the beer. Huge marquees, holding thousands of folk, represent the Seven Munich Breweries. Non-stop oompah

bands take the main stage playing music which by-passes international boundaries and gets everyone singing at the spartan wooden tables. The light Muncher lager is served by strapping waitresses who carry up to eight-litre steins at any one time. (I've struggled with eight empties after only drinking two litres at and 4 Schnapps!) MORE TAKEOVER FEARS

After several weeks of speculation the Australian company, Elders IXL of Fosters fame, have made a formal bid for Allied Lyons worth £ 2 billion. Allied are an enormous company with eight breweries and about 7,000 pubs. They also own the food group Lyons and Tetley tea bags. If the takeover bid was successful the new owners would have a very strong foothold in the brewing market, second only to Bass.

Elders are about one quarter of the size of Allied but their chief executive John Elliott is confident that he can borrow enough money from the worlds'

CAMRA believes the results of ' a successful takeover would be CATASTROPHIC. Mr. Elliott is only interested in expanding his power, whatever the consequences for the consumer. He openly states that Allied lacks behind Bass regarding rationalisation. Breweries not working at 100% capacity are threatened and so are uneconomic pubs. He has also said purchasing in raw materials would be cut. Does that mean wheat, rice, and potato substitues instead of barley. Or less hops; or both? Mr. Elliott is also obsessed with national brands like Fosters. It would be like going back to the seventies and "Grotneys Red Revolution." CAMRA's praise of the large brewing groups is maybe justifiably sparce although it must be said that Allied's policies have often come closer to CAMRA's ideals. They have tried new brews and set up small breweries like Halls and Holt Plant and Deacon. Many traditional pubs have received sympathetic modernisation. Most importantly perhaps is Allied's policy of decentralization with is something else John Elliott is opposed to. So you will see there could be

many dire consequencies if we do not do everything possible to stop this bid. Allied rejected the initial offer but Elders are expected to increase their bid. Allied insist they are not for sale, but as we have seen from previous struggles, this alone is not good

enough to thwart a bid. If Elders were to get a foothold in the U.K. I can imagine many Australian type pubs being awash with weak, pale, thin, cold, fizzy Aussie lager. From a British beer drinker's point of view, far better Elders stay down under - six foot under ?
