BREWERY CLOSURES GATHER MOMENTUM

Boddingtons of Manchester are the latest brewery to wield the axe with the recently announced news that their subsidiary Oldham Brewery will shut for good in April. Oldham was taken over in 1982 and even though Boddingtons gave an assurance they would keep them open for at least five years, CAMRA warned that closure would come eventually. Unfortunately we have been proved right again. The two traditional Oldham beers, Mild and Bitter, will now be brewed at Boddingtons Strangeways Brewery, although whether they will taste the same or will last for long remains to be seen.

Northern branches of CAMRA in particular are very upset at the way Boddingtons have behaved. They have given the brewery good support in recent years especially when preditors such as national breweries have been on the warpath. Yet until recently, Boddies were even threatening CAMRA members with libel action who said Oldham was due to close. Bearing this in mind, plus their takeovers (Oldham and Higsons), introduction of keg beer, high prices and diversification into hotels and restaurants the "Body Snatchers" seem to be acting like the national brewers themselves.




BSCKING BRITAIN'S INDEPENDENTS

CAMRA's Big Seven in 1987 campaign was a concerted co-ordinated yearlong attack on Britain's national breweries. It high-lighted their grip and domination of pubs and brewing in the U.K. such as large tied estates, pub closures, brewery takeovers and swamping us with lager.

1988 will be the year of the independent breweries and CAMRA branches up and down the country will be trying to encourage and promote the best of the smaller and regional companies. Obviously they have got to be viable businesses but they usually look after the interests of their customers more than any national would. Their beers tend to be distinctive in accordance with local tastes. in marked contrast to the bland. standardised national beers such as Websters Yorkshire Bitter.

Without the comfort and security of large tied pub estates small breweries HAVE to provide better beers and service just to survive. Many are not given a fair chance to do so, however, as true free houses are disappearing at an alarming rate. The "big boys" are either buying them up for enormous sums of money or offering free house owners low interest or even non-repayable loans in return to being tied to their beers. Many excellent new breweries have gone bankrupt as a result of these practices, many wonderful beers lost for ever. Our campagin to Back Britain's

Independents hopes to slow down or reverse this trend.

TROUBLE AT CHEQUERS



The building of the new M & B pub on the Monkspath estate, close to Solihull town centre, is bringing about complaints from various quarters. Local residents are worried about noise and disturbance and possible drunken behaviour. They tried to block planning permission but failed after Mitchells & Butlers appealed to the Secretary of State for the Environment. When work began on the site, there were running battles between developers and

residents. There was more trouble when the Mayor of Solihull was invited to attend an official ceremony at the pub site. He accepted the invitation but Shirley councillors said he should not go as this would be an insult to the local residents. The Solihull branch of CAMRA are not against the principle of more pubs but would prefer it, if this was not yet another M & B one. We would like to see other breweries allowed into areas where choice is desparately limited. We know a certain amount of wheeling and dealing goes on, for example a man who gave evidence in favour of granting the pub licence was found out to be a director of the company building the pub!

Annual General Meetings can be dull and boring. True maybe but not in the case of CAMRA. There is nothing like discussion on beer to get people debating! This year's AGM will take place at Birmingham University over the weekend of April 16-17 and promises to be a lively forum of debate over the future direction of CAMRA to the forefront of which will be mergers, takeovers and the Good Beer Guide format..... and after a hard day's debating what better than to attend the on site Beer Festival featuring the best of West Midland beers and a few suprises! NEW G B G EDITOR

Jill Adams remains deputy editor so between them they hope to cancel a few sexist views and show the way for feminine beer drinkers:

SMALL BREWERY GOES FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH



This being CAMRA's year of the Independent Breweries, Hoskin and Oldfield is an ideal brewery to look at to see just how good the smaller, local companies are, and also what there is worth saving! Two brothers helped set up this Leicester based firm after their original brewery was sold up a few years ago.

Their outlets are expanding across the country now, from London to Newcastle, as more agencies are stocking their ales. This expansion is not because of any great promotional gimmick or advertising campaign of the type requied to sell lager . It is because of their excellent varied range of superb beers sold at reasonable prices. HOB is a clean tasting and refreshing best bitter, while Little Matty is a darker version. EXS is a strong, full bodied bitter(og 1050) with a much hoppier bite than many sweet strong ales. Much heavier and darker is Old Navigation (1071) and at Christmas a very strong winter ale called Christmas Noggin is produced.

However, the most unusual and possibly the most distinctive beer is the recently launched Tom Kelly's Stout (1043). Almost black in colour, this superior ale has a lovely thick rich, smooth body but it leaves you with a delicious well hopped bite! Beer connoiseurs mourning the sad loss of Strathalbyn Beardmore stout ought to seek this one out, it is almost as good! With a Mild in the pipeline, it is a pity the beers of all breweries are not as worthwhile seeking out, as those from Hoskin and Oldfield are!

BLACK COUNTRY NIGHT OUT

Last month's social was an excellent pub crawl of The Black Country. A mini-bus was laid on so no one had to worry about drinking and driving when we visited three interesting and varied hostelries. First port of call was Holt's Brewery Inn near Oldbury. Behind this comfortable pub (and visible through an observation window) is the brewery of Holt, Plant and Deakin. The superb, tasty Holts Entire was enjoyed in the pub along with Warrington (Tetley Walker) brewed Holts Mild and Bitter. Our second pub was even better, The Beacon at sedgley, home of the Sarah Hughes Brewery. This cosy traditional pub has been lovingly restored to its former glory and in addition to two M & B beers and several quest beers, is their own Sarah Hughes Dark Ruby Mild. This superior strong ale (og 1058) is a revival of a one hundred year! old recipe and it is brewed in a renovated old brewery at the back of the pub. We were treated to an impromptu tour of this and thanks must be extended to John Hughes, the owner, for his kind invitation. Our final destination was the Pie Factory in Tipton. This is a recent addition to the chain owned by the Little Pub Company, fa med for their Desparate Dan Cow pies. They are semi-tied to Allied



Breweries through loans so the beers are the usual products such as Tetley and Burton Ale plus Lumphamer. This is specially brewed at Burton on Trent only for The Little Pub Company. Entertainment was provided in the form of a popular local jazz band, The Artesian Hall Stompers. They went down very well and ensured everyone went home well satisfied with the evening's activities.

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END OF AN ERA IN WEM



Despite avigorous, well organised campaign, Greenall Whitley went ahead last month with their planned shut-down of The Wem Brewery in Shropshire. It has been in operation for 200 years and many local residents including councillors and the Mayor joined CAMRA in condemning Greenalls heartless act of butchery. Apart from being a major employer in the area, the availability of the beer across much of the Midlands effectively put the town of Wem on the map. The brewery was successful and profitable which makes its closure even more hard to bear. Grenalls had little respect for the wishes of the local community. Months of campaigning against them was like banging your head against

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a brick wall. They wouldn't listen, They wouldn't even talk. Just before the planned final brew, on February 10th, there was an impressive demonstration through the streets of Wem by over 300 people. They were local residents and beer drinkers from points as far apart as Newcastle and Southampton. The marchers were addressed by local town councillors who attacked Greenall Whitley. The Deputy Mayor even said that it might be beneficial if the Board of Directors contained people like Mickey Mouse, Goofy and Donald Duck! The only good thing to come out of all this was the support and friends CAMRA won during our battle. Many Wem drinkers joined up and membership in Shropshire increased by over 30%.

All Wem Ales now come from Davenports, another Greenall subsidiary.
