THE GREAT BRITISH BEER FESTIVAL, 1985

It was reported in an earlier "Boro Banter" that the GBBF was to be held at The Metropole in Brighton. However, since then a few more details have been finalised. The festival will be held in the Exhibition Halls behind the hotel which is situated on the sea front, in Kings Road.

Around 200 real beers should be available plus 20 traditional ciders. Other attractions include food and live music. There will also be a childrens' room. The Fesitval opens on Tuesday. 13th August at 7.00 and runs until Saturday 17th August. Apart from the first day the opening hours will be 5.00 till 11.00. Lunchtime hours will be 11.00 till 2.30 (Wednesday onwards). It will cost you £1 admission for all evening sessions except Tuesday when it will be 50p. Lunchtimes will be free and so will children as long as they are with an adult, of course. Season tickets will be £2.50 but must be obtained in advance from CAMRA H.Q. (Alma Road, St. Albans) before July 31st.

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WEST MIDLANDS BEER FESTIVAL 1985

Plans are now well on the way regarding another beer festival at DIGBETH CIVIC HALL in Birmingham. Last year The Great British Beer Festival was cancelled due to the tragic fire at Bingley Hall but as a consolation a smaller fesival was held at Digbeth. This proved to be a great success so the West Midlands CAMRA branches have decided to stage a similar event at the same venue in September. It will open on the evening of Thursday 5th September and continue with lunchtime and evening sessions on Friday 6th and Saturday 7th. CAMRA members are required to help at all the sessions (including setting up and dismantling) while we need as many customers as possible. It should be well worth the visit as many beers from near and far plus traditional ciders will be on sale in a very pleasant setting. Food and live entertainment will also be laid on, so make sure you are there. It is must for all drinkers who want a rest from M and B and Ansells!

HILL AND PUMP CRAWLING
IN BRECON

During April, a few of Solihull CAMRA branch members went down to Brecon in South Wales for a weekend and we found the choice and range of beers available to be particularly good. The Scenery wasn't bad either! The Brecon Beacons really are a range of very imposing mountains and we had a great walk over them on the one day while the next day was spent exploring the surrounding countryside. One valley full of waterfalls was really marvellous and parts of the Monmouthshire and Brecon canal were equally lovely.

On the pub scene the thing that made the area far more interesting than Solihull was the large number of free houses selling a wide variety of beers. In Brecon itself which isn't a very big town, there are about four pubs selling unusual beers but we only visited two of them. However, about 13 beers were available in those two including Simpkiss, Brains, Sam Powells, Everards, Marstons and Robinsons to name but a few. Inevitably a few of the beers were not quite perfect, but I feel such beer exhibitions do help to stimulate the public's interest in real ale which is what CAMRA seeks to achieve. The other argument is that a pub selling a smaller number of beers can often keep better beer. We visited one pub in Llangorse on Sunday lunchtime which just sold Felinfoel Double Dragon and Robinsons Best. The Robbies was magnificent, I have tasted worse in Stockport!

Two other pubs worthy of mention were an excellent pub in a small village near Brecon which sold 10 beers from all over the country and a home brew hotel in Monmouth, The Queens Head, which was quite pleasant. On our way home we stopped at a pub near Hereford, The Green Dragon in Bishops Frome. This place was a real gem, a fitting way to end a good holiday. Several excellent beers are sold such as Hook Norton. Baileys, Robinson, Wadworths and Timothy Taylor and the building itself is a real old-fashioned country pub, unspoilt, full of character and a joy to be in. Its one fault is that it is too far away from Solihull for my liking!

BREWERY VISIT HOLT, PLANT and DEAKIN

CAMRA branches partake of no greater enjoyment than of visiting a brewery. This is further compounded when the brewery agrees with CAMRA's aims and is run by enthusiastic and dedicated men. Such a brewery is Holt, Plant and Deakin of Oldbury.

Part of Allied it has an estate of fifteen houses in the Black Country with an emphasis on tradition. Beers available are a Bitter and Mild brewed in Warrington, and Entire brewed at Oldbury.

The brewery tap, The Brewery Inn, Station Road, Oldbury saw Birmingham and Solihull Branches gather to visit the brewery which is the old entertainments room now converted to a small brewery. Our guides, David Rawstorne and Bob Smith entertained us to a lively talk on the brewing process. We were all surprised that the brewing plant fitted into such a small area.

Both branches enjoyed the hospitality that Bob and David offered and remained at the brewery tap long after the tour had finished to enjoy more of the Entire.

Mr. Pardoes, Simpkiss, Bathams and Holdens are all Black Country brewers that are held in renown the country over. Allied can be justly proud that Holt, Plant and Deakin can now be added to the list.

THE WHARF


The Wharf in Hockley Heath has reopened after "Host Groupisation". This means it is now an identikit pub off a mass production line, with many other pubs across the country with exactly the same decorations. The Host Group are a subsidiary of Watneys and they are intent on classifying all their pubs into particular "themes" and then decorating each theme identically.

The Wharf is riddled with bland, white "piney" sort of wood and certain "cheapo" fittings. Parts of the bar counter looked tatty and worn after about a week of trading. Traditional Cider has been replaced with keg and the Marstons Pedigree and Manns Bitter are rather unremarkable. One good point is that the old canalside garden is being much improved so the place should be good for families.

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LOCAL PUB SURVEY

The branch has just finished a survey of every pub in our area in an effort to keep track of the many changes that occur regarding range of beers, renovation work, landlords etc. Some pubs that had only been selling real beer for a short time had escaped our notice before the survey, so it was a very useful exercise. Out of nearly 80 pubs only about 2/3 serve traditional beer so there is obviously room for improvement. Between them they serve about 22 different real beers although these are not all available for the whole year. Before SOLIHULL CAMRA was formed (about 3 years ago) only about 13 beers were available so we have obviously made some progress there!

REAL ALE PUBS ON THE INCREASE

The MOONRAKER in Gospel Lane, Olton sells traditional M and B Mild and Brew XI on electric pumps but it isn't a particularly marvellous pub.

The Greswold Hotel on the Warwick Road, Knowle has, rather surprisingly, installed cask Ansells Bitter on handpump in the last few weeks.

The Viking in Ulleries Road, Solihull (off Hobs Moat Road) is another Ansells pub that has recently installed one real ale, this time being Tetleys Bitter. The handpump is only in one room but the beer will be served in other rooms on request.
