Real Ale Heroes, Allan & Brenda Duffy



Steve Dyson, our longest standing branch member, is pictured presenting a well-deserved Real Ale Heroes award to Allan & Brenda Duffy.

Allan &. Brenda joined CAMRA as joint members in Wolverhampton in 1978. Membership was £5 per annum (single or joint) and life membership was 10 times that. Brenda very much wishes they had had £50 to spare so they could have become life members! They never got round to becoming life members subsequently. They moved to Newcastle in 1979 and Brenda served as Treasurer for Tyneside & Northumberland branch for a few years in the 1980s. They also gained experience working at, and later helping to organise the Newcastle beer festival.

They came to Solihull in 1992 and both served on the festival committee for the first Solihull beer festival at the Vaults in Knowle (1993?). Brenda was the Festival Treasurer, and both have worked at every Solihull CAMRA beer festival since, with Allan having been on a number of earlier festival committees. In addition to treasurer, Brenda organised the staffing one year, and the products stall when we

had one in the earlier years.

Brenda served as branch Chair from 1995 to 2000, and she's also been branch secretary for a couple of years and treasurer. She took a (well earned) break taking up the post of treasurer again in 2020. Allan became branch secretary after Steve Wood moved away and has continued in the role for the past 15+ years.



This is the first article in an occasional series about local inns and pubs.

The White Swan was established as an inn around the middle of the 15th century following the founding of the Guild of St Anne (Knowle) by Walter Cook and six others in 1413. Many members of the guild (an early form of friendly society) had to travel considerable distances to attend meetings in Knowle.

Consequently, a need arose for an Inn to provide accommodation and sustenance. Hence the establishment of the White Swan Inn. Documents of the medieval period indicate that the land on which the White Swan stood was owned by the Guild itself. The Poll Tax of 1660 reveals that Knowle had two innkeepers, at the White Swan and most probably the adjacent Grade II listed Red Lion, which Historic England describes as "an early 17th century timber framed building". In 1939, immediately prior to the demolition of the White Swan, it was described as a "late 15th century building with a hall-block between gabled cross-wings, which preserved many of its original features". In 1879 a sale of furniture from the White Swan included four-poster beds, mahogany and Windsor chairs and "about 18 spittoons". We can only speculate why a modest inn needed 18 spittoons!

From at least as early as 1828 (Pigot's Directory) until 1850 the licensee was Ann Sowley. Then there was a succession of landlords until 1900 when William McHardy was described as the proprietor. However, in 1907 he became bankrupt, during the recession that year, according to the Coleshill Chronicle. From the end of World War I until the closure the landlord was Fred Hotchkiss.

From late Victorian times until 1928, the Swan Inn was supplied by Lucas & Co Ltd brewery of Learnington Spa. Ansells acquired Lucas and its estate in 1928 and as Ansells already owned the adjacent Red Lion it is no surprise that in 1937 they sold the White Swan as a delicenced property. The inn was demolished in 1939 with some of the material labelled and carted off by Fletcher's haulage firm to be stored in a field behind Haycocks farm in Bakers Lane to await re-building at a new site. All the pieces were numbered but unfortunately due to the intervention of the Second World War they were overlooked and used in the renovation of an adjacent house and possibly other buildings too.

However, one item from the White Swan has survived and that is the splendid sign which now adorns the Red Lion.

The illustration on page 4 is taken from a colourised postcard of about 1900 clearly showing the sign with the Red Lion beyond.

The site was until recently occupied by the Nat West Bank and had a carved swan on its front as a nod to the site's history.



Walk with a happy ending by John Edwards

When you do the same walk twice within 5 weeks you know it must be a good one, so this is particularly for those CAMRA members holidaying in East Devon & Dorset. It starts at the village of Rousdon on the A3052 east of Seaton and follows an undulating route along paths & lanes north and east to Uplyme, passing the spectacular viaduct of the disused railway line near Shapwick Grange. From there the route goes behind "The Talbot Arms" and becomes a beautiful wooded, waterside walk down into Lyme Regis along the River Lim Path, passing weirs, mills, and a ford well signed with pink arrows.



In total it's around 4 - 5 miles and one of the best bits is that it emerges at the Town Mill complex where the Lyme Regis Brewery, founded in 2010 in an old malthouse / power station battery room, has a Tap Room serving a great range of draught beers & ciders!

Conveniently it has its own sheltered seating area in the courtyard, where there is weekly live music in summer, and on my first visit I was able to relax there and try a float of "Lyme Gold" (4.2% golden ale), "Steady Habits" (5% New England IPA) & "Town Mill Best" (4.5%), before trying a pint of "Black Ven", their 5% London Porter.

I came away with a carry-out box containing 500ml bottles of "Rebellion"

(5% honey-spiced rum stout), "Dorset Pearl" (4.3% pale ale), "Revenge" (5.3% IPA), "Golden Cap" (5.4% craft lager) & "Sailor's Delight" (8% barrel-aged Imperial Stout infused with cherry & vanilla). This was all made possible by the bus stop just around the corner with an approximately hourly service (free with an OAP bus pass) back to Rousdon!



On my second visit I was able to try their new canned, limited-edition "Curious Mary" (8% double IPA) which was created in collaboration with the charity Mary Anning Rocks. This successfully fund-raised to have a bronze statue of Lyme's most famous fossil hunting palaeontologist made and erected in her home town. Created by Denise Dutton, this was unveiled in May 2022, and she now looks across Black Ven, the cliff where she made most of her amazing finds.

My wife tried the "Lilley's Rhubarb Cider" (4%) that was on draught, and this was as delicious as all the Lyme Regis beers. However, if I had to pick a favourite it'd have to be the "Sailor's Delight" with its subtle flavours imparted by the cherries and 9 months ageing in rum barrels!

If you're ever down that way I can really recommend a visit to the Brewery.....and the walk!

A quickie in Bristol !

If you are ever stuck in Bristol and fancy a few beers, there are more than enough to choose from. If you need to stay close to the station, then you can't go far wrong with this selection. Head up Friary Street, crossing the river on the footbridge and continue up to Burton Road where you will find the Barley Mow. Up to 8 beers are available here. It's a Bristol Beer Factory pub and gives you a good selection of their beer. Food is available too.

Retrace your steps over the footbridge and turn right up to St Philips Bridge. Turn right, ahead will be the Bridge Inn. Can't miss it... it has a large mural of Jimi Hendrix on it. An unpretentious local with 4 beers.



Next, we are heading to Victoria Street. Just past Temple Backs you'll find the Kings Head. This is a superb 17th



century pub. It has a very unusual layout and serves up to 4 beers. Another true classic is just round the corner in Temple Street, Cornubia. Dating from the 18th century it is not easy to find but persevere. It has a wonderful garden and is incongruous amongst the skyscrapers hemming it in. Inside expect 6 beers.

So, to our final pub the Seven Stars in Thomas Lane, a walk of about 5 minutes. Another gem here dating back to the 18th century with up to 6 beers. From here it is only 10 minutes back to Temple Meads station. A note though. Check opening times they do vary during the week.

The new committee was voted in unopposed at the meeting and is as follows (you can find contact details in the Useful Contacts section on page 12);



Review of David Jesudason's Desi Pubs

Now here's an intriguing book: a CAMRA publication where many – possibly the majority – of pubs featured don't serve real ale. Bear in mind that CAMRA is at least as interested in supporting our pubs and clubs as in campaigning for real ale, and it starts to make sense.

Factor in that the book may be unique in documenting the history and the rise of 'desi' pubs – and the demand for Indian and south Asian food pretty much everywhere – and the book makes perfect sense.


You may be wondering, what is a 'desi' pub; the author, David Jesudason, spends the first 20-odd pages attempting to explain, though without reaching a single definitive conclusion – the term means different things to different people. The closest you might get would be a pub run by someone of British-Asian descent, which usually serves



good food with an Indian/south Asian flavour – and which is welcoming to all.

Reading the opening section, that last part is crucial; the roots of desi pubs can be traced to the days of open discrimination, of British Asians being made to feel uncomfortable – or flat-out being refused service – in traditional pubs. Some enterprising folk, in areas with numbers of British-Asian residents, started opening pubs that refused to bow to such prejudices. Over the ensuing decades the concept has evolved and matured, to the point where David has visited and reviewed 40-odd pubs for his book.

These aren't your normal reviews; each pub gets several pages, and the author has usually spoken to the proprietor. The reviews are as much about their approach, their aspirations for the pub and its clientele, as it is about the food.

I should make it clear: there's not much mention of beer in the book. That's perfectly fine – the book focuses on the cultural aspects of desi pubs, both in their appeal to non-white drinkers and the food.

What's notable is that the West Midlands punches well above its weight when it comes to desi pubs; of the 41 main reviews, 16 are in our region, more than any other area. That includes the Blue Gates Hotel in Smethwick, notorious for refusing to serve the American activist Malcolm X in 1965, but now one of three Smethwick pubs featured in the book. Jesudason notes, with some surprise, that the local white population has embraced desi pubs, just as much as the British-Asians.

There's five pubs in Birmingham, including the Indian Brewery at Snow Hill – and our very own Tap and Tandoor in Solihull. The author doesn't really agree with the view of the T&T's owner, Ajay Kenth, that it should be viewed as an Indian gastropub rather than a desi pub, mostly because Jesudason tends to my own view that 'gastropub' usually means small portions of expensive, overelaborate food, with drinkers not really being catered for.

Here's how good the book is: at the 2023 Awards by the British Guild of Beer Writers it was named Best Book about Beer or Pubs, while David Jesudason also claimed the Michael Jackson Award for Beer Writer of the Year.

Be warned: about every other photo in the book is of the food on offer at the pubs, and it all looks mouth-wateringly delicious!

Numerous pubs are easy to reach by train – Birmingham, West Bromwich, Smethwick, Rowley Regis, so for a future edition of the Drinker magazine, I'm intending to visit various pubs and write up my experience of eating and drinking in desi pubs. It's a dirty job, but someone's got to do it...

The refurbishment work at the Reservoir in Earlswood, to become a Hickory Smokehouse, has taken longer than hoped, but should be open by the time you read this.

The Harvester on Stratford Road has been refurbished and should also, by the time we go to print, have reopened as an Orleans Smokehouse. We don't know whether it will have real ale or not, so do let us know.

Knowle & Dorridge CC definitely do serve real ale, and their clubhouse has been

under refurbishment for some months, though they have remained open during this time. This work should also be complete by the time you read this.

The Colebrook has recently reopened following refurbishment and we understand the Fieldhouse (both Ember Inns pubs) is due to be refurbished at some point this year.

The Crown in Claverdon remains closed and, as yet, we have no information on its future. If any of you reading this have further information then please let us know.

Just down the road, the badly firedamaged Crabmill is now up for sale by Brunning & Price, and is so on the basis of being a licensed premises. We do not know whether there are any plans to try and sell it for non-licensed development.
